If you were able to attend the annual meeting on May 15, thank you! It's wonderful to be able to meet again in person and see members that don't attend the monthly meetings.

In preparation for the May meeting and this article, I did a little research and realized that our auxiliary celebrated a big milestone anniversary

this past February. The Mercy Auxiliary first began in February of 1923 with 13 members that gathered to sew for the hospital. Yes, the auxiliary is 100 years young! It's amazing to think that this organization has survived for that amount of time. Not only survived but thrived!

This year, we were able to gift the hospital \$115,727. The funds are now distributed immediately to the departments rather than pledged to them, which in the past made them wait a year to receive the funding needed.

In February, a committee of seven auxiliary members met with representatives from 11 departments to hear of needs that would allow them to improve their capabilities in serving the hospital's patients and staff. We were happy to say that we were able to fund the needs of six of those areas.

- Security/Behavioral Services Two humane restraint beds/ One chair/One cot
- Emergency Department A lock for the medication room and 13 carts
- Facilities One previously owned van
- Hall-Perrine Cancer Center Two ceiling lifts
- Surgical Services MARTTI
- HPCC Two ceiling lifts
- Birthplace SleepSacks[®]

We were able to provide for these needs partially due to the success of our Mistletoe Market and Spring Bazaar. Both events gave us record-setting amounts earned. Additionally, Mercy's Gift Shops and Uncommon Grounds provided income to fund this year's hospital needs. Funds raised during vendor sales in the 10th Street lobby were also included in this year's funding total.

We had three wonderful guest speakers this past year. In November, Mary Tharp, Director of Behavioral Health and Mercy Family Counseling, spoke to us about the growing need for counseling. The statistics she reported made evident the necessity for this type of support in our world.

In January, we heard from Justin Anderson, Director of Environmental Services, as he detailed the contributions of this department in benefitting the hospital. Justin told us of the 80 to 90 workers that keep Mercy looking clean/sanitized and inviting for patients, visitors, and staff. This behind-the-scenes department is often overlooked, and we were happy that they were one of the departments receiving funds this year.

In March, our guest speaker was Nichole Plagge, Clinical Manager of Therapies for Physical Therapy and Sports Medicine Services. She told us about the locations that Mercy therapists provide care, both throughout the various departments in the hospital, as well as in the community. Physical therapy for postsurgical healing, mobility and regaining strength enables patients to return to normal activity levels.

At our May meeting, our speaker was Jonathan Arnold, MD, ABPM-UHM, CWS-P, from the Healing Center. He described the many types of wounds that are seen in the clinic and the treatments they provide.

As you can see, the auxiliary had a very busy and successful year. Here's to another 100 years of providing support to Mercy Medical Center! Please continue to support the auxiliary and spread the word that new members are needed.


Mercy Auxiliary awards four Mount Mercy scholarships
