Nancy Morris, PA, recently celebrated 35 years of practice and was a local pioneer as the first certified physician assistant in the Cedar Rapids area.

The profession was so new that even other medical professionals asked about her background and training. "I feel incredibly blessed to have been introduced to this profession right out of college and be a trailblazer in this community," says Morris, who has

been a part of MercyCare Community

Physicians since 1995 and now practices at MercyCare Marion. Her supervising physician is Dr. Sharon Bertroche, "PAs work in a partnership relationship with physicians. I enjoy that association to provide the best possible patient care we can," she explains.

In addition to practicing at MercyCare Marion, Morris formerly served on the board and cares for patients at His Hands Free

Medical Clinic, which provides care to those in the Cedar Rapids community without medical insurance. She also has served on the Iowa Physician Assistant Society Legislative subcommittee for more than 25 years and received the honor of Iowa Physician Assistant of the Year, awarded by the Iowa Physician Assistant Society, in September 2010.

Morris says, "Originally I

planned to go into social work. But I had a personal experience where I was called into medicine by God. I had a degree in sociology with concentration in social welfare and was planning to get a master's in social work. I was aware of the PA program, so I went back to school to get some prerequisites I needed and applied to the program."

She graduated in the fourth class of physician assistants from the University of Texas,

Morris also has a passion for mentoring young people interested in a career in healthcare.

"I've had students job shadow me, from high school to college age. I've also had college students do a rotation with me during PA training," she says.

"I like the teaching part of medicine, whether in a clinical setting or with kids. I love medicine," she continues. "Every once in a while I wonder if there is something else I'd like to do, and I can't come up with anything else. As a physician assistant, I can have a positive impact on people's lives. I treat newborns when they come home from the hospital and I think my oldest nursing home patient is in her 90s.

"I have some families where I see several generations as patients," she says. "Medicine is not only about biological science, it's also a social science. I enjoy treating the whole person. People share a lot about their personal lives and I am privileged to guide and direct them with a whole person approach."
